SHELTER NEWS BY MARGARET VARNER, MANAGER

As always, things move very quickly at RVHS. Last year we built a new 544 sq. ft. isolation unit for our dogs. This wonderful new isolation unit was built with donations from our community. Because Team RVHS strives to keep our pets healthy and safe this isolation building was very much needed.

We had many special cases but there are always a few that stand out for the staff. CJ, a senior male German Shepherd mix was found on the side of the highway in Cave Junction. He was injured, very thin, balding and in need of TLC. CJ stayed with RVHS quite a few months before a staff member took him home. CJ is in a loving home environment with a pack of his own and a snuggly warm bed to live out his life like a pampered senior dog should.

Another case that comes to mind are the three little kittens that were dumped in a box under a volunteer's car in the parking lot during business hours. These 3 little kittens are now known as Doris Day, Shirley Temple, and Elizabeth Taylor. They were all so tiny, balding with ringworm and suffering from upper respiratory infection. They hardly had a fighting chance but with the help of staff and a wonderful volunteer who fostered these sweet babies for months they're now adopted, healthy, happy, and in their forever home. Oh, did I mention adopted by the wonderful volunteer that fostered and cared for them? Day in and day out RVHS staff members deal with so many sad situations so it's nice

to have some Happy Tails to share, such as in 2013 RVHS adopted 223 dogs and puppies and 229 cats and kittens into their forever loving homes. Team RVHS

strives to keep our staff trained and educated with new techniques in the animal health field. We attended conferences like The Humane Society of The United States Animal Care Expo and The Best Friends No More Homeless Pets National Animal Conference. These conferences allow us to stay refreshed, revitalized and educated to continue with the standards of care that sets RVHS apart.

We're always very active in the community going above and beyond what's expected of us. In the first three months of 2014 RVHS staff members went out on many calls and rescues, some of which are very hard to talk and think about. But we're thankful every day that we can help educate the community and be a part of so many Happy Tails.

One hot Saturday last August we got a call that a dog was alone with two puppies behind a supermarket. Tanya went searching for them and found a small dog with two tiny, nursing pups.

Unfortunately, rescuing abandoned dogs is not unusual for us but what made this harder to understand was that this young dog was blind. She was in a frenzy trying to protect her babies but once she felt reassured Tanya was able to bring them all back to the shelter where they settled into our isolation building with its new kennels and soft, soothing music. We named the little family Stevie, Cookie and Sugar.

At first, Mom Stevie had a hard time with the unfamiliar noises, always on guard for any threat. Her desire to take care of her puppies was very strong but now she felt that the people around her were there to help her.

The puppies put on weight, one black like Mom and one tan-white. They looked like Pekingese blends and soon there was a waiting list of potential adopters. But for

HOW WE HELP THE COMMUNITY

CATS AND DOGS: Early in March our community cat spay-neuter program got a call from a man needing our assistance: his girlfriend had left him with an animal menagerie

and he was starting to feel overwhelmed.

The program volunteer knew this was not a good situation and promised to see what help she could find and get back to him. Team RVHS came up with a plan and one week later we went out to see how we could help.

When we arrived we were greeted by a sweet female dog that was ready to jump in





our rescue vehicle and instantly come back with us. We introduced ourselves to the owners and asked permission to enter the single-wide mobile home. What we found inside was clearly an out-of-control situation and thirty or more upset cats jumping all around us. But we have done other cat rescues and working together we were able to secure nineteen cats and kittens in carriers. We took them back to the humane society and did their medical evaluations and

vaccinations. Sadly, we found that ten of these felines had untreatable conditions. Nine cats had only minor medical issues and will soon be ready for their forever homes.

This rescue was very difficult for us. Most of the animals we save from situations like this require medical care, rehabilitation and TLC. No matter how long it takes they stay in our care until they are healthy and adoptable.





happily, Freckles the dog came back with us.

This super-sweet girl is on meds for heartworm now and she's available for adoption. We're still working with the

owners to make sure the farm animals have what they need.

At the end of the day we knew that RVHS made a positive difference for the people and their animals.



DID YOU KNOW?

Oregon's new dog tethering law took effect January 1, 2014. Oregon's new law is designed to better protect humans and animals from the risks associated with keeping dogs on chains:

- Dogs are sometimes hurt or strangled by chains
- Dogs can't reach their food, water, or shelter when chains catch on obstacles
- Chained dogs are as much as 8 times more likely to bite
- Neighborhood disputes over barking or aggressive dogs often involve chained dogs
- At least 1⁄4 of fatal dog attacks in the US involve chained dogs
- Because dogs are naturally social animals, chaining and isolation cause health and behavior problems Under the new law:
- A dog cannot be tethered to a stationary object for more than 10 hours in a 24-hour period
- A dog cannot be tethered to a running line, "zip line" or trolley for more than 15 out of 24 hours A dog cannot be tethered with a choke or pinch/prong collar The new law is meant to end chaining as the main way of housing and keeping a dog. The limits don't apply when dogs are visiting campgrounds and recreation areas or engaged in hunting or herding. The law also sets out clearer requirements for protecting animals from the elements. Outside dogs must have a dog house or other shelter with dry bedding and a solid roof, floor and walls.





How we help, continued

HORSES: By the end of February the Rogue Valley Humane Society had received three reports from concerned citizens within the city limits about two horses.

The complaints were: no shelter and horse in the mud. Tanya and I went out to do a wellness check and found the reports to be true. We introduced ourselves and offered help but we were turned down.

Any animal in distress gets our immediate attention and I told the owner very clearly that if the horses were not out of the mud and in an improved area the next day we would return with Josephine County Animal Control and a sheriff. Shortly after we got back to RVHS we received a phone call from the owner asking for our help.

Team RVHS sprang into action and contacted our "Shelter Angels" . . . anonymous donors who donate funds for materials to help Josephine County residents who want to "do the right thing" for their distressed animals but can't afford the expense. Without hesitation, these good people purchased new field fencing, T-posts, corner posts, cement and hay.

Our wonderful "Shelter Angels" to the rescue again and I'm happy to say that the horses are out of the mud, have good food and a new fence is being built by the owner as I write.

Editor's Note: As always, we hope you enjoy reading about the animals of RVHS. Before we changed the look of this newsletter we made sure that it would not cost us any more money and we're happy to say that it actually was less than printing in black and white.
