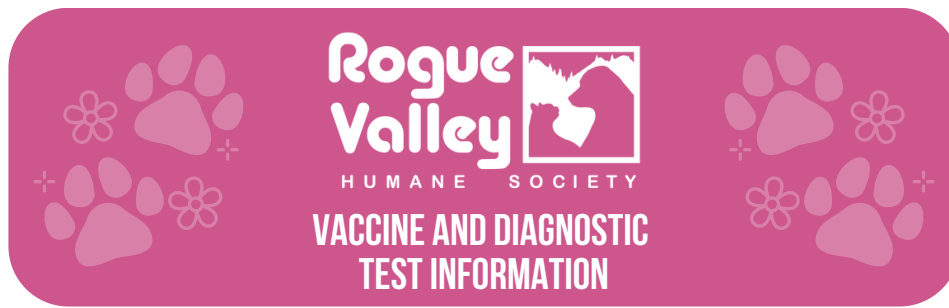

*The cost of deworming medication depends on factors such as the pet's size and the type of medication prescribed. Pricing will be determined once an accurate weight has been established.



● **RABIES VACCINE** (must be at least 12 weeks old)

This vaccine protects against rabies. Rabies vaccinations are important for pets to protect them from the disease and keep others safe. Important reminder: rabies is deadly to both humans and animals.

● **FVRCP VACCINE** (series starts at 6 -8 weeks old)

This is a core vaccine for cats that protects against three potentially fatal and highly contagious diseases:

- Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis (FVR): Also known as feline herpesvirus type 1 (FHV-1), this disease can affect a cat's nose and windpipe. Symptoms include fever, sneezing, inflamed eyes and nose, and discharge from the nose and eyes.
- Feline Calicivirus (C): A potentially fatal disease for cats
- Feline Panleukopenia (P): A potentially fatal disease for cats

● **DA2PP VACCINE** (series starts at 6 -8 weeks old)

This is a core vaccine for dogs that protects against the following diseases:

- Distemper (D): A virus that can cause neurological disease and is almost always fatal in puppies
- Adenovirus type 2 (A): Also known as hepatitis, this virus can cause kennel cough in dogs
- Parainfluenza (P): A highly contagious respiratory virus that can cause coughing, nasal discharge, and fever
- Parvovirus (P): A potentially life-threatening disease that can be transmitted through feces

● **BORDETELLA INTRANASAL VACCINE** (given at 6 weeks old)

This is a non-core vaccination for dogs that helps prevent canine tracheobronchitis, also known as kennel cough. It's typically administered to dogs that frequently visit areas where dogs congregate.

● **HEARTWORM TEST**

Heartworm disease is a serious and potentially fatal condition that affects dogs and cats. It is caused by parasitic worms (heartworms) living in the major blood vessels of the lungs and, occasionally, in the heart. These worms are transmitted through the bite of an infected mosquito.

- Heartworm testing is performed to determine if a pet is infected with heartworms (*Dirofilaria immitis*).
- Many veterinarians use a popular test called a "SNAP" test, which can be run in just a few minutes at your veterinarian's office.
- Heartworm testing is recommended for most dogs before beginning a heartworm preventive program. Periodic testing is also recommended for dogs already on heartworm preventive medication.

● **FELV/FIV TEST**

The feline leukemia (FeLV) and feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV) test is a blood test that determines if a cat has been exposed to or infected with these viruses. The test is often recommended for new cats, cats with illnesses, or cats that have been exposed to other cats with unknown FeLV or FIV status.

● **EAR MITE CHECK (K9/FELINE)**

Your pet's ears will be examined with the use of an otoscope to check the inside of the ear canal. A sample of ear debris will be collected to view under a microscope to determine if ear mites are present.



● NITENPYRAM (Capstar) FLEA TREATMENT

This is a safe and fast-acting flea treatment that provides 24 hours of protection. To prevent the spread of fleas to other patients in our clinic, we require treatment for all pets with visible fleas at the owner's expense.

● SELAMECTIN TREATMENT

This will get rid of fleas, ear mites, roundworms, hookworms, and heartworms. Multiple treatments may be necessary: please consult your veterinarian for follow-up treatments. Additionally, in-house treatments can only be provided concurrently with surgical procedures.

● EAR CLEANING

Depending on what your pet needs, this could be an ear cleaning solution used to clean the inside surface areas of the ear, or it may be a more extensive cleaning that includes an ear flushing if ear mites are involved. This only cleans the ears—no medication will be applied.

● MICROCHIP & REGISTRATION

A microchip is implanted under your pet's skin, between the shoulder blades. The microchip contains a unique number that is linked to your pet's information in a database. When a microchip scanner is passed over your pet, it emits a frequency that the scanner reads to look up your contact information. When you register your pet's microchip, include all relevant contact information, such as both landline and cell phone numbers. Keep your contact information up to date with the registry.

● SOFT E-COLLAR/HARD PLASTIC E-COLLAR

Available for purchase at the front desk, these e-collars will reduce the likelihood of your pet licking their incision and causing serious injury. We have found that cats are more comfortable in the soft e-collars rather than the more traditional hard plastic e-collars.

● INTESTINAL PARASITE TREATMENT

We utilize praziquantel injectable, Drontal (Fel) / (Plus), or Pyrantel Pamoate to treat common intestinal parasites contracted through contaminated food, water, feces, or surfaces. Puppies and kittens are particularly susceptible and may acquire these parasites from their mothers. Typically, multiple treatments are necessary, especially for young animals; consult your veterinarian for follow-up treatments.
